



Reverse Osmosis Machine: for the Dialysis expansion enabling



more patients to receive their treatment here at home where their support and family systems are. *more on pg. 6. **Electrocardiogram:** for Diagnostic Imaging. An ECG is the simplest and

an important diagnostic tool to determine course of care for the patient.









50 lb. Washing Machine: just one of a team of machines that helps to clean the over 475,000 lbs. of laundry at the hospital each year.

Replacement Probe: for the portable ultrasound machine for the ICU. This small but mighty device is used to guide physicians when inserting drains into the abdomen or lungs, to place central IV lines in critically ill patients and anaesthesia has been using it for insertion of spinal needles and epidurals to give anaesthetic medication to our total knee and hip replacement patients.

Manual Treatment Table: for the Rehabilitation department. This adjustable platform table surface is specially designed for therapists to treat and tend to patients.



Working for you, Janet Paulson & Jennifer Buchanan-LWDH Staff Spotlight

I've been here for 15 years now and I've worked a lot of places in the building. My coworkers become family because we spend so much time together." -JP

Q: Prior to the pandemic, what did your position at LWDH entail?

A: Everything related to infection control from daily surveillance of emerge and inpatients to consulting with construction renovation.

Q: How has your role changed over the last year?

A: 80-95% of what I do is COVID related directly or indirectly. Staff work restrictions, sick days, assessment centre, hospital and patients. With the vaccine rollout to staff, we are now scheduling, staffing, educating and learning how to navigate the Ontario CoVax database.



Janet Paulson, Infection Prevention and Control Practitioner/Nurse since 2016

Q: What has been the most challenging thing at your job?

A: Time. Just keeping up with the changes and making sure we are circulating information appropriately and in a timely fashion. Also keeping up with questions from emails and phone messages as they all need to be addressed for everyone's safety.

Q: What has been the most rewarding part of your job?

A: Having a great team. Recently the staff worked so well together to identify and declare an outbreak. The ability of the team to contain it with no further spread after the fact, and were able to declare the outbreak over 14 days after it began. Which was the best case scenario.

Q: Do you think that all of that preparation impacted the handling of the outbreak?

A: It did for sure. We were able to get all of our surveillance testing of staff and patients done really quickly. The lab was able to test the majority of samples on-site for patients. We were able to do our true exposures and symptomatic staff on-site as well, having that resource and the ability to do that made the difference.

Q: Is there anything in particular that you would like the community to know about working in health care during the pandemic?

A: We are not out of this yet. Early on they predicted it would be a 2 year thing and we are only in year one. We still need to wear our masks, physically distance, and wash our hands so that we can see a decrease in our community positivity rate.

Q: Do you have a favourite story to tell about your time at the hospital?

A: I've been here for 15 years now and I've worked a lot of places in the building. My coworkers become family because we spend so much time together. Since I've been in Infection Control I get to know almost every department and get to know all the staff. My work family is bigger now than when I worked in just one department.

Q: Tell us a little bit about yourself outside of the hospital.

A: The Paulson's are very big Lake of the Woods lovers. We spend as much time as possible on our houseboat, fishing, lots of swimming and exploring. We prefer the boat but have done lots of ice fishing this year. Normally we look forward to a winter vacation but not recently. This year will be our 5th year travelling to Sioux Narrows by houseboat, we go for a week and it beats any Mexican vacation.



Jennifer Buchanan, Occupational Staff Health Nurse

Q: What is your position at LWDH?

A: I am the Occupational Staff Health Nurse. My main responsibility is the safety of our staff, be it through immunizations, return to work or modified work, flu clinics, mask

fit testing and policies; making sure staff are working safely.

Q: How has that changed, now that we are a year into the pandemic?

A: Since Covid the role has really expanded. Janet Paulson and I have joined forces and now we call ourselves IPC/OHS Team. The Infection Prevention & Control and Occupational Health Team because the majority of our time now is spent on Covid related tasks; developing and implementing new policies and procedures, keeping our staff safe, providing staff education and updating everything based on the Provincial guidelines. The pandemic has really brought us closer working as a team and we are also thrilled to have the help of Lynn Ronnebeck our retired IPC nurse who helps us out a lot.

Q: What would be the most challenging thing about your job at this time?

A: The changes are the most challenging. Early in the pandemic, every day we were telling people something different. That's really gotten better, things are consistent now. There's just slight changes, it's more thought out and we are able to implement things that have a bit more lead time.

Q: How did all of the prep work help when the Covid-19 outbreak was declared?

A: The big thing is our PPE and making sure staff are wearing PPE properly. The preparation of our staff on what they need to do when we have positive patients is what really helped us with that. It's important to encourage and remind staff that they've got this! They've been trained and they know what to do.

Q: What do you find that has been the most rewarding for you?

A: The most rewarding is when I see a positive change. When I'm able to identify a positive change and improve something for an individual or an entire department.

Q: Is there something you'd like the community to know about working in health care during the pandemic?

A: It's really been tough for everybody. There has been a lot of changes in the last year. We have to remind everyone that what we have been doing is working, the spread hasn't been that great in this region and we need to keep that up by continuing to wear our PPE and continuing to physically distance and perform hand hygiene. I think we are doing a really good job in our hospital. I have to give kudos to Janet and Lynn, working as a team is the only way that we are making it through this.

Q: Do you have a favourite story that you'd like to tell about your time at the hospital?

A: I think the most fun part was a couple years ago I was able to bring in CBRN (Chemical, Biological, Radiological, and Nuclear) Training into our facility here, and had 3 days of training with the EMAT Team from Southern Ontario for Code Orange or External Disaster. We had people from all areas of the hospital take part, it really brought us all together to see how we could all work together.

Q: Tell us a little about yourself outside of LWDH, what would you like to share?

A: I have a piece of property where I keep busy with my house and garden projects. I enjoy spending time with my friends and my family and going RVing when time allows. I have my two puppy dogs as well. That's basically all it is, that quiet life right now. Work is so hectic, you just want to decompress and relax when you get home. I'm out in the country so it's just so nice and quiet: I see the trees and relax.

About LWDHF...

Who is LWDHF?

The Lake of the Woods District Hospital Foundation was established in 1992 and continues to be the lifeline between your community and your hospital.

LWDHF is governed by an 11 member board which meets monthly; has 3 full-time employees and benefits from over 2,000 volunteer hours per year. We are dedicated to raising funds for the purchase of medical equipment and capital infrastructure. Since our inception, LWDHF has transferred over \$20.73 million to Lake of the Woods District Hospital (LWDH).

Our needs are ongoing.

The Ontario Ministry of Health and Long Term Care covers, on average, 80% of your hospital's operating costs. This limited funding for healthcare increases the financial pressure for your hospital in addition to the fact that none of this funding is designated to cover capital expenses. There is not a matching program from the Ministry to help purchase equipment, which leaves LWDHF to raise the funds needed, dollar for dollar.

Your hospital has identified over \$3 million in capital equipment and infrastructure needs over the next 2 years.

HIGHLIGHTS from LAKE OF THE WOODS DISTRICT HOSPITAL in a PANDEMIC YEAR

All Nations Hospital Project: The project to redevelop the hospital did not halt due to the pandemic, in fact, this challenging year only solidified the dire need for new hospital space. The Project Planning Team, Steering Committee, consultants and Community Project Planners forged ahead and completed stage one of the project on time and on budget by the end of April 2021.

The pandemic pressed the team to be extremely creative with efforts to continue gathering public input. When the initial engagement stage wound down 1704 hospital users had participated in 56 engagement sessions in 16 different communities, 449 online surveys were completed and 2390 were engaged through events. AND over 360 clinical services participants shared their indepth knowledge and ideas in focus group style work. This extensive feedback combined with input from experts in architecture, cost consulting, engineering and statistical analysis informed an in-depth plan (the Stage 1A Proposal) which was presented to the Ontario Ministry of Health, Health Capital Infrastructure Branch. Proposed is a new hospital with increased square footage, increased # of beds for Mental Health & Addictions and a staffing model to meet patient needs far ahead into the future. Some of the service delivery model themes identified Infract DOCUMENT CONSTRUCTION: CONSTRUCT

of Western Medicine and Traditional Healing on a new campus and building strong partnerships. Site development options were extensively explored

and a recommended site has been selected.

Details will be shared in the summer of 2021 as the next round of engagement launches. The public can look forward to more opportunities to be involved in the planning of your new hospital.

Ojibwa Healing Room: In many All Nations Hospital Project engagement sessions patients and families shared the desire to have easy access to smudge in the hospital. December 2020's good news was the opening of a permanent room on the 3rd floor of the hospital dedicated for this purpose. LWDH & Kenora Chiefs Advisory have partnered to have Client Navigation & Utilization Coordinators work in the hospital. These navigators are available to assist patients who would like to smudge as part of their healing journey. The navigators also assist with translation, transportation arrangements, access to cultural healers and general system navigation.

Dialysis Unit Relocation: LWDH proudly held a grand opening of the new dialysis unit in early January 2021. Relocating this unit from the main floor near the Emergency Department to the 4th floor was no easy feat (it was an 18-month journey!) but so very beneficial as the expansion made immediate improvements in terms of patient and staff safety, privacy & comfort AND provides the opportunity for future service expansion.

The project was truly a collaborative team, partner and community effort! Sincere thanks to donor Nora Marr whose single donation catapulted the project. Nora generously donated \$100,000 in her late husband William's memory, which went directly towards the purchase of the Reverse Osmosis machine which was absolutely vital to the expansion. This kind donation couldn't have come at a better time as the Foundation needed to focus their efforts on working with the community on the COVID-19 Emergency Fund.

HIGHLIGHTS from LAKE OF THE WOODS DISTRICT HOSPITAL in a PANDEMIC YEAR



Surgical Services Expansion: March of 2021 saw spinal fusion surgeries performed at LWDH for the very first time courtesy of Dr. David Puskas, a visiting orthopedic surgeon from Thunder Bay. Spinal fusion can be a life-changing surgery (the permanent joining of two or more vertebrae of the spine) and this was the first time in Canada that a non-teaching centre and hospital of this size has hosted the procedure - TRULY something for Northwestern Ontario to celebrate! This win for LWDH was due to hospital partners across the region collaborating to deliver a regional approach to surgical services as a way of managing the surgical backlog. This takes shape in Kenora as LWDH offering up operating room space and the human resources to support the procedures. The movement of surgeries also supports expanded capacity at Thunder Bay Regional Health Science Centre to deliver acute care to admitted patients who are COVID-19 positive.

Care closer to home was a clear priority throughout the All Nations Hospital Project engagement process and this expansion is just one of the ways this vision is beginning to take shape. Three patients from NW Ontario underwent this momentous surgery in NW Ontario, facilitated by a surgeon from NW Ontario. The regional approach also offers the opportunity to nurses and physiotherapists to employ their full scope of practice through care of these surgical patients.

The surgical services expansion can be credited to the regional network, to Richard and Millie Stovel's \$1 million donation towards the \$10 million LWDH Operating Room redevelopment project (August 2018), to the incredible LWDH surgical services team and to the LWDH Foundation 50/50 proceeds & individual donations which equated to a recent \$160,000 in OR equipment purchases.

Vocera Launch: April 2021 brought with it exciting changes at LWDH! The wearable, voice-controlled Vocera Smartbadge and the Vocera Vina smartphone app were deployed. These mobile solutions allow hospital staff providing patient care to connect and communicate with simple voice commands (without having to remove / replace PPE!) and send & receive secure messages. The SmartBadge also functions as a staff duress system as it includes a panic button on the device to easily and discreetly access help.

This project was in direct response to staff input and aligned well with feedback gathered through the All Nations Hospital Project engagement work. Not all improvements need to wait for the new hospital! Implementing this technology NOW in our current facility is intended to significantly improve workflow, patient care and staff safety.
