2024 Par 3 Charity Challenge

Under hot, sunny skies on July 11, 2024, golfers and volunteers gathered for the 4th Annual Par 3 Charity Challenge, driven by The Dingwall Group. The event raised an impressive \$225,252 to help fund a new Mammography Unit at the Lake of the Woods District Hospital (LWDH). With this replacement, the hospital upgrades its mammography capabilities to include tomography, contrast-enhanced imaging, and stereotactic biopsies - more services close to home.

The all-inclusive 18-hole golf event saw remarkable participation and generosity from the community with a full slate of golfers, 70 sponsors, and 85 volunteers contributing to its success. A highlight of the day was the Golf Ball Drop which, for the second year running, captivated attendees by the scene of Jarnel Contracting's crane hoisting 500 pre-sold, numbered golf balls 20 feet above the 18th green. Linda from Kenora ON won the \$3,000 closest-to-the-hole prize.





The success of the Par 3 tournament was driven by the strong commitment to healthcare demonstrated by Kenora and regional business sponsors.

Behind the Scenes: Wheelhouse on the Water 2024

Every summer in Kenora, the Wheelhouse on the Water event, hosted by Wheelhouse Cycle Club Winnipeg, brings together cyclists for a day filled with stunning lakeside views and electric energy. The 2024 edition, held on August 5th, showcased the incredible dedication behind the scenes that transforms this event into something extraordinary.

Preparation begins in Winnipeg where the Wheelhouse Team gathers the day before the event to meticulously organize towels, cycling shoes, and essentials. Loading 40 bikes, each weighing 160 pounds, into a truck is a complex task, especially with the heavy flywheels necessary for resistance. Excitement fills the air as the team arrives in Kenora. A five-ton truck loaded with equipment is carefully transported to the dock where hours are spent arranging bikes, setting up sound systems, and conducting sound checks to ensure a seamless experience for participants.

After setup, the team enjoys a well-deserved dinner and fine-tunes playlists that will motivate riders during the event. As dawn breaks, the dock comes alive with spinning wheels and three back-to-back rides, each filled with energy and purpose. This year, top donors had the special opportunity to request songs during their rides, adding a personal touch to the experience.

The spirit of togetherness shines through, thanks to the dedication of the Wheelhouse Motivators and People Team—Becky, Eric, Erin, Hannah, Jody, Josee, Julia, Maddy, and Taylor—who pour their hearts into making this event a memorable fundraiser. The Lake of the Woods District Hospital Foundation is deeply grateful for their unwavering support and the positive impact they continue to make on enhancing health care, at home.




37th Annual Tree of Life Appeal

YOUR PHILANTHROPY AT WORK

New medical equipment

Central Line Sim Mannequin

Central lines are helpful for patients that cannot otherwise get an IV in place to deliver critical medications and draw blood. Having this mannequin/clinical skills trainer will ensure our physicians can be trained locally on critical care and anesthesia skills. Critical care skills include central line placement which physicians encounter infrequently.

This specific model also allows anesthesiologists to practice a regional block for upper extremity surgeries, a procedure that is coming to LWDH in the next year. This model is helpful for ICU, Internal Medicine, ER physicians, surgeons and anesthesiologists to keep their skills up to date. We can also help train our learners at LWDH to ensure they have the skills required to provide the best possible patient care. This mannequin will be part of our current Education Department high-fidelity training simulators.

Automated Tissue Cassette Printer

An automated Tissue Cassette Printer drastically increases the efficiency of the Pathology Department (Laboratory) by eliminating the need for staff to manually transcribe information onto cassettes. This laboratory equipment is a great timesaver.

The cassette printer applies the pathology specimen number on the front of the cassette with a laser, decreasing the risk of transcription errors, ultimately improving patient safety.

The lab staff previously had to manually transcribe the specimen number onto the cassette which is extremely time consuming and inherent to transcription errors.

This advanced equipment streamlines accurate labeling and facilitates faster turnaround times for diagnostic results, allowing for timely and accurate diagnoses. This leads to quicker treatment decisions and more reliable pathology services.

Ultrasound Probes

The ultrasound is an important unit within the Diagnostic Imaging department at LWDH. The three probes that accompany it are necessary to sense specific physical attributes and communicate this to the overall image.

With the specialized probes, the hospital can perform a wider range of specific studies, leading to more accurate and timely diagnoses. Enhanced diagnostic capabilities mean that pathology can be detected and treated earlier, improving patient outcomes. This investment ensures that the hospital can meet the growing demand for diagnostic services, providing patients with the highquality, timely care they deserve.

90lb Industrial Washer


The Nutrition and Environment Department at LWDH prioritizes this essential aspect of patient care. Thanks to the generous support of our community, we have recently acquired a new washer.

LAKE OF THE WOODS DISTRICT HOSPITAL UPDATES



Accreditation

The Lake of the Woods District Hospital is thrilled to share that it has been Accredited with "Exemplary Standing" by Accreditation Canada. Accreditation with Exemplary Standing is the highest possible ranking and is used to designate hospitals that attain the highest level of performance and standards, demonstrating an exemplary commitment to quality care. Canadian hospitals are accredited by Accreditation Canada typically every four years, and through this process the care that LWDH provides is assessed against evidence-based quality and patient safety standards.

Emergency Department

Nurse Practitioner Service

To address wait times and seasonal patient surges, Lake of the Woods District Hospital launched the Nurse Practitioner (NP) Service in 2023. NPs are registered nurses with advanced education and experience. NP's work independently and collaborate with physicians as needed. They can assess, order diagnostics (labs and imaging) and diagnose, prescribe medications and develop treatment plans to discharge patients home.

In this added service to the Emergency Department, NPs manage less acute cases (CTAS scores 3, 4 and 5), improving wait times, increasing patient satisfaction for less acute patients and freeing up bed capacity for more acutely ill patients (CTAS 1,2,3) that the emergency physician team treats. About the Canadian Triage and Acuity Scale

The Canadian Triage and Acuity Scale (CTAS) is a tool used by Canadian hospital emergency departments to help define a patient's need for care. Emergency department visits remain high and wait times continue to be an issue largely as a result of system overcrowding. All efforts to resolve this problem through improved ED efficiencies across Ontario hospitals have failed due to the ongoing issues of timely access to care in the community and lack of inpatient and long-term care spaces to support rapid outflow of patients from the ED.

All patients arriving at the LWDH Emergency Department will have a timely assessment upon arrival by a specialty trained triage nurse completing the triage process. This is a mandatory step for all patients visiting the ED either walk-in or arrival via ambulance. This is both subjective (what the patient tells us) and objective (vital signs, visual, etc.) information is gathered. This tool is used to determine the severity score 1-5.

The graph to the right explains the triage scores. This assessment using the CTAS is a nonjudgmental, non-biased computer-generated score that resulted from the data inputted into the system. CTAS was developed to prioritize ED patients based on acuity and risk.



CTAS 1 - Resuscitation

Conditions that are considered threats to life or limb requiring immediate aggressive intervention.

CTAS 2 - Emergent

Conditions that are a potential threat to life or limb. Requiring rapid medical interventions.

CTAS 3 - Urgent

Conditions that could potentially progress to a serious problem requiring emergency interventions.

CTAS 4 - Less Urgent Conditions with potential for deterioration

that would benefit from intervention.

CTAS 5 - Non Urgent

Conditions that may be acute but non-urgent and interventions can safely be delayed.

The triage level assigned using the CTAS criteria is a mandatory data element to be used in all Canadian Hospital Emergency Departments for reporting to the Canadian Institute for Health Information (CIHI).

Renovations

A multiphase renovation project is underway in the ED. To date, a more effective team station, physician station, medication room and new supply room have been completed. The new registration, switchboard and triage spaces opened July 22, 2024.

The final work in this project is to upgrade the waiting area with a clear line of sight from registration and security. For information visit www.lwdh.on.ca
